### Ringing in the New Year at Lodge Banquet!

Thank you to the 216 Arrowmen who attended our banquet on Sunday, January 4th! The lodge officer team would also like to thank Sparrows Point Country Club for hosting us!

During the banquet, several awards were presented. These awards include the Ceremonialist award which recognizes Arrowmen who dedicate their time to the ceremonial and induction experience, the Elangomat award which recognizes Arrowmen who serve the candidates during their Ordeal, the James A. Mitchell award that recognizes new youth Arrowmen who have made an effort to participate in the lodge and chapter, and the Nentico Camping award which recognizes units that make year-round camping as well as supporting the lodge a priority.

Each year, Nentico Lodge presents a few distinguished awards. The first of these is the Vigil Honor, which recognizes distinguished contributions to the lodge, OA, the Baltimore Area Council, and/or Broad Creek. This year, 16 Arrowmen from Nentico Lodge were recognized with the Vigil Honor. Next, the George Naylor Award honors the youth and adults who give exemplary service over an extended period of time and is named after George Naylor, a Vigil Member of Nentico Lodge for over 60 years who is most well-known for starting the tradition of Lodge Service Beads. This year, Jim Brooks, James Carico, and Dean Groth were recognized with this award. Last but not least, the Founder's Award is meant to recognize Arrowmen who demonstrate in their everyday life, the spirit of achievement as described by founder E. Urner Goodman and co-founder Carroll A. Edson. This year, Nathan Buckingham, Devin Flagler, and Tara Qualey were recognized with this award.

We were honored to welcome National Order of the Arrow Director, Cortland Bolles to speak at our banquet. During his speech, Cortland focused on youth

empowerment, encouraging all the youth to continue growing throughout their leadership and participation.

## An Update on the Inductions Changes

Over the past several years, the National Order of the Arrow Committee has evaluated the use of American Indian Activities (AIA) as part of our program, including the induction and ceremonies experience. As a result of this review, several policy changes were enacted over time.

Effective in 2026, all lodges must have a written agreement with a state or federally recognized tribe in order to continue AIA programming in any form (e.g., OA ceremonies, powwows). Nentico has opted for ceremonialists to wear their field uniform, with ceremonial medallion, for over three years, so this taking effect poses no operational changes for our lodge.

As you may be aware, a new induction experience will be unveiled in 2026. More details will be released in the months ahead, with various training events scheduled throughout the year to prepare lodges to execute this new induction. When the new induction experience is fully rolled out, all lodges across the country will cease use of American Indian attire in OA ceremonies.

Even though our own induction will differ from the new experience, we must stay laser focused on creating an impactful induction for all of our future Arrowmen. # What Do You Know About Nentico History?

Since its founding, Nentico Lodge 12 has had a long and storied history that we love to share. But it's more than just patches. Most of you know that Nentico is over 100 years old, celebrating our 100th anniversary in 2022.

Did you know:

- Nentico Lodge is the oldest unmerged lodge in the nation
- Nentico's first members were inducted by the Order of the Arrow's Founder, E. Urner Goodman, at Camp Linstead
- During its first anniversary in 1923, Nentico hosted the Third Meeting of the Grand Lodge, the equivalent of today's National Order of the Arrow Conference (NOAC)
- Our first Vigil member was our lodge's founder and Scout Executive, W. Perry Bradley, who served as the Order's Grand Scribe
- Nentico has had a National Chief - Robert Heistand - and a Region Chief - Doug O'Connell

The Museum and History Committee is responsible for researching and collecting the lodge's history, maintaining and augmenting the museum collection and curating history displays. You may have seen our museum displays at the Lodge Banquet or Lodge Fellowships. We are working on building new history displays for the museum and making more information available on the web and in publications. Look for more articles in future editions of *The Arrow of Light*. # Building LEADers

What better place to learn to lead than at the Section E10 LEAD Conference? On January 10th, Nentico, Nentego, and Amangamek-Wipit came together at Central Presbyterian Church in Towson, MD, for a fantastic day of trainings, fellowship, and growth led by fellow Arrowmen.

The day started off with a welcome from Amangamek-Wipit's Adam Lane, the coordinator of the event. After a brief introduction, we jumped right into a capstone training on design thinking led by Willa Rothenberg. During this training, Arrowmen worked to create magazine collages that reflected their personal visions and develop SMART goals that supported their vision.

Later in the morning and afternoon, we held breakout sessions focused around five tracks: Leadership, Communication, New Arrowmen, Train-the-Trainer, and Advisers.
